May God continue to Bless this fraternity with His care.



February is NAACP Support Month

Brothers, your support and participation are requested to complete this internationally mandated activity as set-out in Chapter IV, Article I, District Programs and Celebrations, Section 1(c) : NAACP Support: The month of February is set apart as NAACP Support Month. Brothers, we are seeing a resurgence of overt behavior that appears to again produce real and potential adverse impact on people of color. We need to have an impact on our communities in terms of legal defense/redress; voter education/registration and voter mobilization; economic advancement; and strongly resisting ongoing activity aimed at voter suppression. These are among the activities that the NAACP undertakes on our behalf, but the ability to do this is grounded in having members to carry out these programs. Membership is thus the lifeline of the NAACP. Brothers, you are very much needed to step up, become a member, and do some serious community UPLIFT.

In keeping with our longstanding Fraternity mandated program that each District and Chapter maintain an annual supportive membership in the NAACP, the Committee is requesting the

following information from each active 2nd District Chapter:

1. Confirmation, for the 2011 Fraternity year, that each Chapter had a Silver Life Membership (Fully Paid or Subscribing) in the NAACP. If not, did the Chapter have at least a 2011 Annual NAACP membership?

2. Certification that each Chapter will have a (2012) Fully Paid Silver Life Membership in the NAACP (\$750.00) or a Silver Life-Subscribing membership (\$75.00 per year for 10 years). If not, will the Chapter commit to having, as a minimum, a 2012 Annual NAACP Membership (\$30.00)?

2nd District at the NAACP & CEF Stand for Freedom March

New York, N.Y. December 10, 2011. The 2nd District NAACP & CEF Committee and over 100 civil rights organizations marched from 61st St. and Madison Ave., the Koch brothers' NYC office, to Dag Hammarskjold Plaza at 47th St. and 2nd Ave., across from the United Nations. We came from all over the tri-state area and beyond. Protesters led by NAACP President Ben Jealous, UFT President Michael Mulgrew, the Rev. Al Sharpton, Gresham and NAACP New York President Hazel Dukes marched on Madison Avenue south to the plaza near the United Nations in honor of the UN's Universal Declaration of Human Rights, passed on Dec. 10, 1948. The civil rights and union leaders spoke out against what the NAACP calls an aggressive attack against voting rights across the country. Many laws that were either proposed or adopted were written to require prospective voters to provide extensive documentation in order to get a voter ID card. In more than a dozen states around the country laws are being passed requiring photo IDs at the ballot box and making it harder to vote absentee and vote early. Union lead-

ers, community activists, immigrant groups and elected officials assembled near the headquarters of Koch Industries. Many protestors stated that the Koch brothers have donated millions of dollars toward efforts across the United States to change voter identification requirements, bans on the formerly incarcerated and early voting periods.

According to many organizers of the march and rally, voting rights for minorities and the poor are under siege. It was estimated that over 25,000 protestors participated in the march and rally. The coalition that starting the event included organizations such as National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), the National Urban League, Service Employees International Union Local 1199, and the American Civil Liberties Union. At the rally other civil rights leaders as well as politicians expressed their support to stop voter suppression. These dignitaries included Senator Charles Schumer, and John Payton, President-NAACP Legal Defense Funds



City of Baltimore Approves Pi Omega Chapter Management and Operation of Recreation Center plus \$50,000 Seed Money Award

Baltimore, MD. December 2012. On December 21, 2011 the Baltimore City Board of Estimates, which is comprised of the Mayor, City Council President, Director Of Public Works, City Solicitor, and City Controller, approved the Management and Operation of the Easterwood Recreation Center with a seed money award of \$50,000 to the Omega Baltimore Foundation, Inc. (Omega Baltimore) in response to the City of Baltimore's Request for Proposal for Management and Operation of City Recreation Centers B:50002071. Omega Baltimore will partner with the Baltimore City Department of Recreation and Parks (BCRP) by assuming the management and operation of the Easterwood Recreation Center located on 1530 North Bentalou Street in Baltimore, Maryland 21216.

Our proposal demonstrated organizational viability to provide custom programming to meet the needs of the Coppin Heights/Ash-Co-East community. A partnership with BCRP through the acquisition of the Easterwood Recreation Center fits well within our Omegas Uplifting Baltimore project. The goal of Omegas Uplifting Baltimore is to execute a community-based social program with specific emphasis on youth development and healthy

and active aging for older adults. The Youth Development Initiative will create a safe and fun environment that fosters physical activity and educational growth while providing valuable life skills. The Healthy and Active Aging Initiative will focus on providing opportunities for physical fitness, continued learning, and intergenerational interaction for older adults.

The youth and aging populations are some of the most vulnerable members within our community; therefore, they deserve the best efforts that can be achieved through innovative public-private partnerships. As college educated African-American men, our organization has a longstanding track record of providing scholarships to city high school students as well as a variety of social action services supporting the Greater Baltimore Community. Our proposal demonstrated a commitment to develop a formal partnership with the City of Baltimore by re-establishing a vibrant and active recreational presence at the Easterwood site.

Omega Baltimore is a 501c (3) nonprofit organization formed to assist the Men of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Pi Omega Chapter in servicing the community.



Pi Omega Chapter Conducts 21 Social Action Projects from November 2011 thru January 2012

BALTIMORE READS (November 2011)

In 1992, Baltimore Reads created a Book Bank to collect, house, and distribute **for free**, thousands of new and gently used children's books. Books of all kinds are donated to the Book Bank. The Book bank augments school libraries, and opens its doors to teachers, families, churches, Head Start programs, shelters, children's shelters and other community establishments. To date, Baltimore Reads have provided over 1.3 million books to Baltimore area teachers and disadvantaged families. Pi Omega Chapter collected and donated 500 books to the Baltimore Reads Book Bank

HIV/AIDS INITIATIVE (November 2011)

The Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter in collaboration with the Commission for Baltimore City on HIV/AIDS embarked on an education and awareness campaign to inform Baltimore about the plight of HIV/AIDS in the African-American community. The Brothers distributed brochures and condoms at various and diverse venues.

THANKSGIVING FEAST PROJECT (November 2011)

Since 2000, the Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter have traditionally held a Thanksgiving Day Feast at the Fraternity Center. The feast is held to feed the indigent and shut-in who live in the neighborhood surrounding the Fraternity Center. Since its inception, Pi Omega has fed over five hundred residents in the community. Last year the Brothers of Pi Omega fed between 150-160 residents. Assisting with the serving of food and drinks were the families and friends of the Brothers. This year the Brothers fed over four hundred (400) people. The cost to the chapter was \$1,379.00 (The caterer traditionally prepares food for more than 100 residents.)

THANKSGIVING TURKEY DONATION (November 2011)

The Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter donated turkeys to the Thanksgiving Loving Arms, Inc. and the Humanitarian, Inc. The turkeys are to feed the residents of the McCulloh

Homes Housing Project and the residents of the Zion Towers Senior Building. This effort is the result of collaboration between Pi Omega Chapter and the Cherry Hill Development Corporation.

AFRO MRS. SANTA CAMPAIGN (December 2011)

Since 1988, the Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter has contributed bicycles, can goods, and money to the Afro-American Newspaper's Afro Mrs. Santa Campaign. The Afro Mrs. Santa Campaign provides food, clothes, toys, and funds to indigent families in the Baltimore community. This year Pi Omega Chapter gave Afro Mrs. Santa 27 bicycles. The cost to the Chapter was \$1,000.00

BALTIMORE STATION-BAKER STREET (December 2011)

The Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter donated packages of toothpaste, lotion, mouthwash, soap, shampoo, and razors to the Baltimore Station at Baker Street. The Baltimore Station is a place where veterans find the structure and living environment that speaks to their needs. Most of the counseling staff are veterans, which provides them with the knowledge and experience to serve the special needs of homeless vets who often use drugs to "quiet" the effects of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). The residents of the Baltimore Station include veterans from Vietnam and the Gulf War, as well as veterans from the Iraq and Afghanistan wars.

CHRISTMAS BASKETS (December 2011)

Since 1984, the Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter have distributed Christmas baskets of food to the residents who live around the Fraternity Center. The original concept was to target families whose children attended Mathew Henson Elementary School. The school identified the families that had fallen on hard times during the holiday season. Over the years, the program has expanded to include any family living around the Fraternity Center. The Brothers fed 30 families from the school. The cost to the Chapter was \$564.00.

CHRISTMAS FOR CHRISTOPHER'S PLACE (December 2011)

The Brother of Pi Omega Chapter participated in the 5th Annual Christmas of Christopher's Place. The purpose of the event is to help indigent fathers provide a Christmas for their children. Pi Omega's contribution to the event was to provide the wrapping paper, tape, and ribbons for all the gifts. The gift wrapping party was held at the Reginald F. Lewis Museum.

JUNGLE BELL RUN/WALK FOR ARTHRITIS (December 2011)

The Brother of Pi Omega Chapter participated in the Jungle Bell Run/Walk for Arthritis. This event is a fundraiser for the Arthritis Foundation. Arthritis effect men, women, and children of all ages. The event raised \$65,000 for arthritis research.

KAMI'S JAMMIES (December 2011)

Kami's Jammies fits the mission of the Casey Cares Foundation, which provides uplifting programs with a special touch to critically ill children and their families. To help brighten their day and make hospital stays more comfortable; the Kami's Jammies Program provides pajamas, robes, slippers and monthly themed pajama parties to young inpatients in the pediatric department at area hospitals. The Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter donated over 20 pairs of pajamas for this most worthy program. The cost to the Chapter was \$285.00

LOVING ARMS. INCORPORATED (December 2011)

The Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter donated toys to Loving arms, Incorporated. Loving Arms, Incorporated is non-profit organization that provides hope and shelter to homeless, runaway youth.

MARYLAND FOOD BANK (December 2011)

The Brothers of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Pi Omega Chapter donated can goods and foodstuffs to the Maryland Food Bank. The Maryland Food Bank is an affiliate of Feeding America. The Maryland Food Bank provides nearly 14 million tons of food annually to 1,000 Network Partners – including pantries, soup kitchens, emergency shelters, low-income daycare centers after school programs, senior centers, rehabilitation centers, and other feeding programs. The Maryland Food Bank operates two facilities: one in Baltimore, serving central Maryland and one in Salisbury, serving the Eastern Shore.

MECU CLOTHING DRIVE

(December 2010)

The Municipal Employees Credit Union (MECU) sponsored a clothing drive to collect hats, coats, gloves, and scarves for St. Vincent DePaul of Baltimore. The purpose of the clothing drive was to provide warm clothing for indigent families in Baltimore City. The Brother of Pi Omega collected and donated 42 coats for the clothing drive.

MY SISTER'S PLACE

(December 2011)

Each morning when My Sister's Place opens its door, homeless women and their children in Baltimore City know they have a safe and supportive environment where they can spend their day. My Sister's Place provides shower and laundry facilities, case management, life skills workshops, parenting classes, GED preparation, breakfast and a light dinner. Even more importantly, My Sister's Place provides resources and direct services to women who need to begin the transition back to residential stability and self-sufficiency. Each day is an opportunity for My Sister's Place to help the homeless believe in themselves and explore new horizons.

The Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter and employees of Motor Vehicle Administration assisted My Sister's Place in helping the homeless ladies by providing cases of laundry detergent and bleach so the ladies could clean their clothes.

QUES COATS FOR KIDS (December 2011)

Pi Omega Chapter collected, cleaned, and distributed coats, hats, and gloves to elementary school age children. The purpose of the clothing drive is to collect coats for children who may not be able to afford a coat to attend school in the winter. Pi Omega Chapter collected fifty (11) coats, fifteen (15) hats and fifteen (15) pairs of gloves. The items were presented to the Baltimore County Infant and Toddler Program.

RADIO ONE TOYS, TEDDY BEAR, & CLOTHING DRIVE

(December 2011)

Under the direction of Dr. Cathy Hughes, Radio One Incorporated sponsors an annual toys, teddy bear, and clothing drive. The purpose of the event is to solicit gifts for indigent families in the Baltimore community. The Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter assisted in this effort by providing bicycles and toys for this most worthy cause.

THE READING TREE

(December 2011)

The Reading Tree is a non-profit organization that supports children's literacy by getting books into the hands of children. Its mission are to keep books from contributing to the saturation of our nation's landfills and to collect from families who no longer want them, and deliver them to children, families, schools, and libraries that desperately need books. The outreach of the Reading Tree extends to local schools and libraries in the United States. Some books are sent overseas to libraries and schools in developing countries such as India, Nigeria, Kenya, and the Philippines. The Brothers of Pi Omega collected and donated 500 children's books to The Reading Tree.

SARAH'S HOPE

(December 2011)

Sarah's Hope, Mount Street provides 24-hour emergency shelter, case management and other support services for homeless women and children in the Sandtown-Winchester area of Baltimore City. On-site services include: intensive

case management, meals, service linkage, life skills training, parenting classes, employment readiness, health screenings, public school enrollment, child and youth services and activities.

Pi Omega Chapter, in conjunction with St. Gregory Church, sponsored a Christmas party for the children at Sarah's Hope. Pi Omega Chapter contributed the toys for the project.

The cost to the Chapter was \$ 585.00.

ST. VERONICA CLOTHING DRIVE

(December 2011)

The brother of Pi Omega Chapter donated men, women, and children clothing to the St. Veronica Church Clothing Drive. The clothing drive was an initiative by the church to provide clothes for the people residing in the Cherry Hill community.

TOYS FOR TOTAL HEALTH CARE

(December 2011)

The Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter donated toys to Total Health care (THC). THC is Maryland's largest minority operated nonprofit, tax-exempt community health center. THC provides medical assistance, medical services, and medical programs that include HIV, substance abuse, and nutritional services.

PROLOGUE, INCORPORATED

(January 2012)

Last year the Brothers of Pi Omega Chapter provided a microwave oven, a 72 piece dinnerware set, pots and pans, toaster, an eight piece cook set and can goods to Prologue, Incorporated. Prologue, Inc. is a community mental health program that strives to offer the best option for recovery from mental illness through services provided in the least restrictive setting. Prologue Inc. aims to restore an individual's ability for independent living, socialization and managing one's symptoms in a cost-effective way. Prologue Inc. offers skill training and basic education courses geared to people with psychiatric disabilities to prepare them for employment and self-sufficiency.

Baltimore, MD. November 19, 2011. The Brothers of Pi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated hosted the 2nd Annual Restoring-Uplifting-Leadership-Education-Success (R.U.L.E.S.) For Black Men Symposium. This monumental event was held on the campus of Morgan State University in Baltimore, Maryland. The conference was designed to help young men rise above negative stereotypes and become productive assets to their respective communities. The day long male-only event aims to empower underrepresented male groups through collaborative learning, group building and most paramount and brotherhood. The symposium tackles specific issues and concerns affecting African-American males by way of

panel discussions, age-focused workshops, and themed breakout sessions such as the Fatherhood Initiative agenda created by President Obama. With an attendance of over three hundred males ranging from nine years and older, the Brothers of Pi Chapter strive to guarantee that the next generation of male leaders is well-equipped with the tools needed for great success. R.U.L.E.S won the Program of the Year Award in 2010 and we were asked by Morgan State Administration to turn the program into an annual conference due to the success of the event and positive feedback. Our goal is to not only continue uplifting the surrounding Baltimore community, but to expand and raise awareness throughout the state.

Epsilon & Omicron Chapters Bring the Fight Against Domestic Violence to Brooklyn

New York, NY-- On Friday, October 28, 2011 the Epsilon and Omicron chapters of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. collaborated with the Epsilon Pi and Brooklyn Alumnae Chapters of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc to host their fourth Domestic Violence Awareness forum. The event took place at the Brooklyn campus of Long Island University. The program was focused on educating young people on the perils of domestic abuse so as to be more aware of the signs and the necessary steps to take to protect victims and avoid domestic violence.

The highlight of this year's Domestic Violence Forum was a keynote address from Brooklyn District Attorney Charles J. Hynes, who shared his personal story of growing up in a household where he witnessed his mother being abused by his father. The DA's touching remarks were underscored by his commitment to fighting Domestic Violence and he discussed the work he had done in establishing the Brooklyn Family Justice Center for those affected by Domestic Violence and for opening the nation's first Domestic Violence unit in a prosecutor's office which was designed to deal specifically with domestic violence cases.

The program also featured candid testimonials from members of the audience as well as a spoken word contribution from LIU student Katherine George. "Domestic Violence Awareness Month is October, and we firmly believe the messages delivered through this forum will carry on with us in attendance well beyond the here and now because it is not just a monthly issue. Domestic Violence is serious in that it happens too often and we need to be cognizant and proactive every day," said Epsilon Chapter's Keeper of Records and Seal (secretary), Ervin C. Roberson II.

The statistics surrounding violence in relationships are staggering to say the least. In the United States, 25% of women have reported being assaulted by a partner. The program highlighted that many women often become isolated when they are victim of domestic violence. Often they feel like they have lost their self-worth and a feeling of guilt and embarrassment comes over the women. "It is difficult to tell women to leave someone they love or that they have self worth after the emotional and psychological damages that domestic violence carries," said DA Hynes, "but it is what we have to do because [domestic violence] is a vicious cycle with horrible endings."

Omega Psi Phi Fraternity made Domestic Violence Awareness one of its international initiatives four years ago after Epsilon Chapter hosted the first Domestic Violence Awareness forum of its kind within the Fraternity. Since that forum in Brooklyn, Epsilon Chapter has continued to host the program annually and remains committed to addressing this important issue. "This year we wanted to involve our undergraduate men from Omicron chapter and take the forum to a college campus" said Epsilon Chapter basileus (president) Charles Coleman Jr. "Because of the alarming numbers of young people involved in Domestic Abuse situations," Coleman continued, "it was important to us that we reach out to college aged students so that they can recognize the signs of an abusive relationship early and know what to do and where they can go."

Chester, PA. November 2011. On November 8, 2011 Nathaniel C. Nichols was elected to serve as a Judge on the Delaware County Court of Common Pleas in Pennsylvania. Before the election, the Delco Bar Association conducted a survey to evaluate the judicial candidates and based on the survey results Brother Nichols was the highest vote-getter among Democrats, receiving 280 well-qualified votes and 116 qualified votes. He will be the third African-American to serve on the bench in Delaware County. His term expires in 2022.

Brother Nathaniel C. Nichols, better known as “Nick” earned his undergraduate degree in Political Science from Howard University.

He earned his J.D. from Columbia University School of Law. After his admission to the bar in 1974 Nick served the Delaware County Legal Assistance Association. He then went into private practice founding the firm Early, Nichols and Givens. In 1986 he joined the faculty of Widener Law School as a clinical professor. During his time at Widener law school he has served as Dean of Students and the Director of Clinical Programs. Nick is admitted to practice before the Pennsylvania Supreme Court and the Federal Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania. He is a member of the American, Pennsylvania, and Delaware County Bar Associations.

Brother Nichols joined Omega Psi Phi, Fraternity, Inc. at Alpha Chapter (Howard University) in 1970 during his senior year. He was one of the 28 members of “Freeze’s Rollin’ 28” (FR28)

After moving to Media, Pennsylvania he joined Epsilon Pi Chapter (Chester, PA) in the late 1970’s. As a member of Epsilon Pi chapter, Nick was one of the creators and implementers of a program called Foot Steps Past and Present. This was a living history tour of Delaware County specifically for Chester Upland School students. In 1984 Nick was voted Man of the Year by the brothers of Epsilon Pi Chapter. In 1990 he was recognized by the 2nd District Council of Omega Psi Phi for his service to the Council

In 2010 Brother Nick was recognized at the Grand Conclave in Raleigh North Carolina for his 40 years of service to Omega with a plaque commending, “his service and devotion to the fraternity during which he exemplified the four Cardinal Principles: Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance and Uplift”.


Bro. Joseph's research interests include principal preparation, principal development, school improvement planning, and school/community relationships. He is the author of numerous peer-reviewed articles

Chuck was the past chairperson of the board

of directors of the Hamilton Township John O. Wilson Neighborhood Service Center, chair of the Association of Interested Minorities (AIM) in Hamilton, and chair of the board of directors of the State Credit Union. He had been a member of the board of directors of the American Red Cross Rescue Union, Mercer County Human Service Advisory Council and executive board member of the NAACP, and a member of the [Rotary Club](#) of Hamilton Township. He was a 43 year member of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. 

While in his early years he excelled in athletics, especially football, gymnastics and track and field. His superlative performance in high school led him to be highly recruited by five colleges of which he selected Florida A & M College under the legendary coach Alonzo Smith “Jake” Gaither. He was a stellar player on two National Championship teams of 1950 and 1952

Brother DeShields, while in attendance at Florida A & M acquired another love. He was a participant in the University’s Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) program. This career prevailed over a very lucrative one in the National Football League (NFL) and the Philadelphia Eagles. Brother DeShields solidified a military career and in doing so, chose a path less traveled by his contemporaries. His decision initiated a 27 year career in the Army. The importance of this determination appears to establish the essence of the man. He found his purpose not to be aligned with popular sentiment. What came to be his legacy was defined in his “decision” Brother DeShields, a retired U.S. Army Colonel, was a dual rated master aviator and former senior flight instructor with more than 25 years’ experience in Army aviation and air-mobile operation. He served as a Battery Commander in the 82nd Airborne Division, two tours in Vietnam and was a Combat Commander responsible for more than 3000 troops. He is recognized as one of the most decorated pilots throughout the entire Vietnam era, having received numerous awards, to include the 29 Air Medals. For his brilliant performance in the Vietnam experience, he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross on three occasions and a Bronze Star. You should also be advised that these awards are listed two positions beneath the Congressional Medal of Honor, the highest medal our country provides. Brother Charles E. DeShields died on April 19, 2011 and was interred at Arlington National Cemetery on August 16, 2011 at 11 am with full military honors.

Brother Cook received his Bachelor of Science in Chemistry at John C. Smith University and was initiated into Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. via Rho Chapter on December 8, 1955.

On December 30, 1958, while serving in the US Army, Brother Cook married Jessie Oliver, and the newlyweds moved to Tacoma Washington immediately following the nuptials. After his military service, Brother Cook and Jessie moved to Brooklyn, NY. Brother Cook held many jobs in his early career including working as a Chemist for the New York City Department of Hospitals and Health and selling cosmetics for Fuller Products. In 1965, he was recruited as an agent for the New York Life Insurance Company. He worked for New York Life for 28 years before retiring in 1993. In 1972, Brother Cook was the first African American in New York State to receive a Chartered Life Underwriter (CLU) designation. He also received his Chartered Financial Consultant (ChFC) designation in 1986. He spent the last 15 years of his career as Managing Partner for the Manhattan General Office. Ladda was very proud to recruit and mentor agents and managers in the insurance business.

Brother Cook belonged to numerous clubs and organizations over his lifetime. Brother Cook joined the Alpha Upsilon Chapter “Brooklyn Omega” of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. where he served as the Chapter Chaplain, Chapter Vice Basileus and Chapter

Basileus. Brother Cook served on, and was the Chairman of various committees in the chapter, however, those of note are: the Reclamation Committee and the Fundraising Committee where he served faithfully and diligently while carrying out his duties. In 1985, Brother Cook was named the Alpha Upsilon Chapter Omega Man of the Year. Brother Cook was the past President of the NY Chapter of the Johnson C. Smith Alumni Association. He was born on August 1, 2006, and that day turned out to be the greatest gift and blessing a couple could have. Our son was born with the same needs and desires as all other children, such as being loved by his parents, playing with his brother and other kids, and learning what life has to offer. As a result of his diagnosis, we have to closely monitor his medical condition by checking his heart, ears and vision. We also worry about his low muscle tone, but we learned he is still what is considered 'normal as any other child.'

to be .07% of the National Institute of Health's (NIH) budget. This is exponentially low compared to funding for other disabilities such as Fragile X, Cystic Fibrosis and Multiple Sclerosis. Studies show that the impact of learning more about Down syndrome can positively affect Alzheimer's, Autism, and heart related diseases. If you're wondering how you can help, you may be interested in the Trisomy 21 Translational Research Parity Act of 2009, alternatively known as the "21 Act." This legislation supports creating centers of excellence,

establishing coordination committees at all federal health agencies, and developing a patient registry and bio book to assist with Down syndrome testing.

As we think about other causes we support, please take time to show support for Down syndrome. With your help, we may be able to find a cure for this and other intellectual disabilities, and provide a better life for those in need.

The Founders' Banquet recognized three individuals from Southern Maryland for their achievements and service to the local community by awarding our Citizen of the Year Award.

Pastor Dante King, founder of Greater Mount Zion Church, was honored with the award for Calvert County. Pastor King's church started with 15 members in 2000 and has grown to more than 1000 members. According to Pastor King's bio, he has lead his church to feed and house the homeless, sponsor back-to-school drives, and give hundreds of Thanksgiving baskets to local families in need. In addition to his church services, Mr. King also has a weekly radio show where he ministers and teaches to the community.

Colonel Donald M. Wade, a native of Hughesville, was the Charles County award recipient. During his career, he was an assistant Professor of Aerospace Studies at North Carolina A&T State University and worked for the US Air Force headquarters located in the Pentagon. In 1990, Colonel Wade retired from active duty and was hired by the Prince George's County School District to establish a Junior ROTC program at Eleanor Roosevelt High School in Greenbelt, MD. Currently, Colonel Wade serves on the Charles County Board of Education and is a member of the Archdiocesan Board of Education of Washington, DC.

The St. Mary's County award winner was Mr. Elmer Brown, of Drayden, MD. Mr. Brown served on the St. Mary's County Housing Board and was instrumental in starting the Sail-to-life

He is the first African-American board member of the First National Bank of St. Mary's County. Currently, Mr. Brown is the owner and operator of Brown's Maintenance Services in St. Mary's County.

Recently, we have all been inundated with stories detailing the horrors concerning the Pennsylvania State University sex abuse scandal. The Brothers of TLL Chapter felt outraged, saddened, and compassionate towards the victims and families involved in the scandal. The silver lining in this tragic event is the creation of various discussions that promote child abuse awareness and help foster change.

Although none of us can prevent all unpleasant situations from happening to our families and us, there are some practical steps that we can take now to help fight child abuse. On a grand scale, we can support the activities of agencies that fight abuse and also

have their information readily available in order to contact them if we suspect child abuse is occurring. Background checks are an added safeguard and TLL Chapter adopts this notion by having participants for its mentoring program, the Purple Boot Initiative, submit to complete background checks before working with the youth.

In the home, TLL Chapter also encourages parents and guardians to keep an open line of communication with their children. It is very important to ensure that our young people can recognize the different types and stages of sexual abuse, and what to do if it occurs to them or their friends. If for any reason children cannot talk openly to their parent or guardian, they should know how to call or seek help from another person they trust.

We may not be able to prevent all tragedies, but together, we can continue to promote awareness and the practical steps to detect and fight them. TLL Chapter is committed to this and is actively fighting the abuse of children and adults in Southern Maryland.

 - If there is more than one chapter in your area then I suggest setting up a meeting where all parties can attend in order to maximize your time.
 - If there is another chapter in your area that possibly shares the same local BBBS then perhaps a partnership between the chapters will suffice and maximize different brother's participation.
- Notify me of your meeting and send me the name of your counterpart in BBBS and if there are any plans to collaborate on any events.
- Copy your corridor rep with all information that you have given me; ultimately I will contact them directly for progress in their Corridor.

All information will be relayed to first Vice Grand Brother Knox and the chairman of this initiative brother Mathews, locally the information will be disseminated to our DR brother Kenneth Rodgers and first Vice DR brother Marvin Hicks as information.

It is the hopes of the Social Action Committee Chair that the undergraduates take a particular interest with this program. Some of the young men are high schoolers and could really use some kind of support or direction to get into college and possibly pursue Omega.
