Please be reminded that neither IHQ or the 2nd District is accepting money orders or checks.

3. There has been a change in the platform for the district website. The IT chair Brother Ed Hill along with Co-Chair Brother Jeff Spratley and committee member Mike Logan have been working tirelessly to switch the information and get the new website moving. We've already seen some changes that are beneficial to the district.

4. The Bus ride initiative has been cancelled due to the lack of registrants. FROM THE DESK OF THE GRAND BASILEUS



January 15, 2019

Recently, I learned of a most disturbing conglomerate of egregious and downright alarming accusations from women regarding the behavior of men purporting to be members of our fraternity. While I have discovered that several of the alleged incidents go back twenty-eight years, each and every one of them, whether an Omega man was involved or not, struck a chord of utter disappointment in my heart. Some reading this might expect that I would minimize the accounts of these women - I do not. Others reading this might expect me to defend the men reportedly involved in these instances - I will not. And there are those who might expect me to deflect the responsibility to solely law enforcement or another entity in these matters - I cannot. The protection of womanhood, as a principle, is something that all Omega Men learned from the earliest days of our Omega training, and is a principle that shapes our philosophy today. It is the ideal that has transcended nearly 108 years of Omega history.

To anyone who has experienced behavior less than becoming of any man, you should be taken seriously. While I am humbled to serve as Grand Basileus of the Fraternity that I love, I am first a husband and a father of all girls. I am also a mental health professional who has provided mental health counseling to individuals and families for twenty-seven years. In my experience, it is helpful to reach out to not only law enforcement (who should be reached primarily) but also to 1-800-656-HOPE, a toll-free and confidential national sexual assault hotline. In addition to fielding allegations of sexual assault, they connect you with local resources to get confidential support services, they raise the visibility of sexual violence and advance the public's understanding of the crime, and they help create and advocate for laws and regulations that make communities safer and support survivors. The National Sexual Assault Hotline has been listed as a resource for the last four years on our website (www.oppf.org).

We do not condone assault or find justification for behavior that can be described as lewd and lascivious. To each and every member of this Fraternity - I will continue to use the full power of our constitution, bylaws, and this office to assure that our membership follows the cardinal principles that were sworn to Omega. You will have your right to a defense, as you do in the law, but you will not be entitled to any pass from this office if your behavior involves subjugating women to demeaning and deliberately disrespectful behavior.

Finally, we do not pretend to have all of the solutions. We are an organization of men who are striving to be better men and better contributors to our communities. As such, we have reached out to other international presidents of the Divine Nine to assist us in further developing programs and mandates designed to provide early recognition of inappropriate behavior and speech that, if left unchecked, can lead to additional horror stories that no one should have to endure. I will make it my mission to place it as an agenda item during our next series of joint meetings to not only come up with ideas but solutions that we can all buy into for true improvement. I thank each of those wonderful organizations and their leadership in assisting us in shaping the reputation of our fraternity from reactive to proactive in matters such as sexual assault. I implore all male organizations to join us in fighting sexual violence and in protecting and respecting our women. We are committed to internal changes to produce external results. This is not who we are. We are men of Omega.

It has been said that some of the greatest sermons are the ones without words. When I think about the example that Aunt Liz has demonstrated it can truly be described as a sermon without words.

Well, what do you mean Brother Preacher? Can I pause parenthetically to give you, what I believe are the most critical attributes of her sermonic message without words on how to complete our journey on this side of paradise?

She demonstrated it, first, by her Christ like humility. Humility that can only come from God. God ordained her to show the world where she lived, worked, prayed and prayed that humility has and always will be strength in disguise.

The second attribute of her sermon without words was the fact that she was an accomplished business owner. This was not just her craft; this was in fact her calling. This was her ministry; this is how she shared her humility, shared her wisdom and shared her gift with those that were served through the value added, professional yet personal customer service of Flex Limousine service.

The third attribute of her wordless sermon was demonstrated through the way that she treated others. As the family was preparing to march in; I was asked if I could stand in his stead. Thanks be to the one who continues to look beyond my faults, and always supplies my each and every needs, I agreed and was able to deliver.

At the end of the service, Aunt Liz did something in her own majestic way, that only she could do...she smiled and said thank you, and something to the affect that I did a great job! I tell you that coming from Aunt Liz, a woman who was, in my opinion, the epitome of strength, a bridge builder; one who set the bar high in everything that she does....that meant the world to me. And it was though God allowed her to encourage me to continue to be ye always ready for service.

The last thing that Aunt Liz said to me at the end of prayer, December 16, 2018, the last Sunday she would see on this side of heaven, she simply said, "don't stop praying".

Can I pause parenthetically and let you know that today, everyone under the sound of my voice, if you understand the things that I have briefly conveyed to you in my own little way; you should honor Aunt Liz by demonstrating the attributes that she demonstrated as a way of life for the remainder of your dash on this side of the Jordan river.

Just like Aunt Liz, continue to fight a good fight, find, follow and finish your course, and keep the faith.

And most importantly...keep Praying!

Second District NAACP Project: We Need More Cops From The Community In The Community

Second District NAACP Committee & Zeta Iota Iota Chapter Philadelphia PA: On December 12, 2018 the Second District NAACP Committee, Zeta Iota Iota Chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated and the Prince Hall Masons hosted a Police and Fireman's Job Fair at the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania 4301 N. Broad Street.

Over seventy professionally dressed eager young men and women from diverse backgrounds attended the job fair. The city departments that participated were the Philadelphia Police Department, The Philadelphia Sheriff's Office, The Philadelphia Fire Department as well as Pennsylvania's Office of the Attorney General.

Presenters shared important hiring information and tips from each of their respective departments. Candidates were given the opportunity to apply on the spot on line to all four agencies. They were instructed on the next steps once they received notification their application was on file. They were told how to prepare in anticipation of being accepted into the various academies.

For young people, it is important to know that to get hired for state and municipal police work you should have no outstanding debts such as delinquent utility bills and delinquent parking or traffic tickets. For the Police Department having poor credit may place your application at risk. Hence, Omega Psi Phi, Fraternity plans to host post application training that will assist with credit repair and entering into negotiating debt resolution with the City. We plan to also assist with test preparation to enhance test scores to increase acceptance percentages.

Thanks to the aid and assistance of Brother Qasim Rashad, Second District NAACP Chairman, and Brother Keith Coleman, Zeta Iota Iota member and Community Liaison to the Sheriff's Office, this project will be a mainstay in Philadelphia. Our goal is to assist with the placement of minority law enforcement officers and first responders in communities that lack such essential representation.

The Second District NAACP committee is planning to host another Law Enforcement Job Fair at the upcoming 71st Second District Conference April 25 – 28, 2019. We invite our members, especially our undergraduate members, to attend and apply to the various law enforcement agencies


Second District Fatherhood and Mentoring Committee

The International Reclamation and Retention Committee (IRRC) of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. plays a vital role in the lifecycle of our fraternity and its members. By creating and providing programs focused on “Reclamation and Retention,” we actively support the continued growth and development of our dynamic fraternity.

Every member is an integral part of the foundation of this brotherhood and we cannot take active membership for granted. Members are the most important component of our brotherhood and your level of involvement and commitment directly impacts the success of this fraternity and its initiatives.

Brothers reclaiming inactive Brothers is an ongoing part of our reclamation program. Every financial Brother should be consistently reaching out to inactive line brothers, chapter brothers, classmates, co-workers and any other non-financial brother(s) you meet. Let him know that Omega needs him and wants him to come home.

Primary Goals and Objectives:

Establish a process for reclaiming 10K non-financial members by 10-31-2019;

Achieve 100% retention of existing members from the previous year;

Create an incentive for Brothers, Chapters, and Districts to reclaim and retain the most Brothers on an annual basis;

Establish an International Reclamation and Retention “Motto & “Campaign.”

Our Motto is “Each One Bring One”

The campaign is called – “Each One Bring One Reclamation Challenge Campaign

Every financial Omega Brother is asked to commit to bringing in at least one non-financial member on an annual basis starting 11-01-2018. Each reclaimed Brother is also responsible for bringing in another non-financial brother(s) during the year. Any Brother who has been non-financial for more than a year will receive written communication from the Grand Basileus and/or District Representative letting him know that he has been missed and asking him to come back into the fold.

Every chapter is asked to host an annual “Round Up” meeting/event and invite all non-financial Brothers. This meeting/event should strictly focus on “Reclamation and Retention.” It is the recommendation of the IRRC that a specific reclamation event take place in February or before the chapter’s 2019 District Meeting. A monthly reclamation activity should also be conducted by each chapter.

Every District is asked to create a dedicated page on its website which details the steps necessary to assist inactive and non-financial members to return to active membership with contact information on the District Reclamation/Retention Chairman. Alternatively, Brothers should refer to the IHQ website for this information.

At each district meeting your District Representative will devote a session to “Reclamation and Retention” initiatives. (District Reclamation and Retention Chairs will lead this session.)

Criteria for awards to be implemented under the “Each One Bring One” Reclamation Challenge Campaign. The top three districts (small, large and overall district with the largest number and percentage of reclaimed Brothers) will receive awards and be recognized annually and at the 2020 Conclave by Grand Basileus Marion. The top two chapters in each district (small and large by number and percentage) will also receive an award at the district level and be recognized annually by the District Representative at the District Meeting and by Grand Basileus Marion at the 2020 Conclave.

Finally, the IRRC is working on sorting through the IHQ Reclamation and Retention data base and will be providing chapters through the District Reclamation and Retention Chair with information on nonfinancial members who were previously affiliated with your respective chapter. Individual Chapters and Brothers are asked to review this info and reach out where possible to these brothers in an effort to get them back financial with the Fraternity (Local Chapter, District, and National). Part 2 will focus on Retention and information will be distributed by January 1, 2019 from the IRRC.



Investment Corner by Brother Anthony Young

The Investment Corner, a series of articles to bring information and understanding in the area of Finance and Money. The purpose of the corner is to share economic concepts, as well as develop ideas for Omega Men to organize ways and methods in grow, build, and use “Capital” as an investment tool, or how to leverage “Capital as a mean of working resource for economic gains. The Corner, is to help the organization, and its members in business or business development as it is in financial ownership for the business owner and our chapters within its Districts. Let’s start with “What is Capital”?

In economics, capital consists of an asset that can enhance one’s power to perform economically useful work. For example, in a fundamental sense a stone or an arrow is capital for a caveman who can use it as a hunting instrument, while roads are capital for inhabitants of a city.

Adam Smith defines capital as “That part of men’s stock which he expects to afford him revenue”. The term “stock” is derived from the Old English word for stump or tree trunk. It has been used to refer to all the moveable property of a farm since at least 1510.[1]

Capital goods, real capital, or capital assets are already-produced, durable goods or any non-financial asset that is used in production of goods or services.[2]

Capital is distinct from land (or non-renewable resources) in that capital can be increased by human labor. At any given moment in time, total physical capital may be referred to as the capital stock (which is not to be confused with the capital stock of a business entity).

Capital is an input in the production function. Homes and personal autos are not usually defined as capital but as durable goods because they are not used in a production of saleable goods and services.

In Marxian political economy, [3] capital is money used to buy something only in order to sell it again to realize a profit. For Marx capital only exists within the process of the economic circuit (represented by “M-C-M”) —it is wealth that grows out of the process of circulation itself, and for Marx it formed the basis of the economic system of capitalism. In more contemporary schools of economics, this form of capital is generally referred to as “financial capital” and is distinguished from “capital goods”.

In narrow and broad uses:

Classical and neoclassical economics regard capital as one of the factors of production (alongside the other factors: land and labour). All other inputs to production are called intangibles in classical economics. This includes organization, entrepreneurship, knowledge, goodwill, or management (which some characterize as talent, social capital or instructional capital).

This is what makes it a factor of production:

- The good is not used up immediately in the process of production unlike raw materials or intermediate goods. (The significant exception to this is depreciation allowance, which like intermediate goods, is treated as a business expense.)
- The good can be produced or increased (in contrast to land and non-renewable resources).

These distinctions of convenience have carried over to contemporary economic theory.[4][5] There was[when?] the further clarification that capital is a stock. As such, its value can be estimated at a point in time. By contrast, investment, as production to be added to the capital stock, is described as taking place over time (“per year”), thus a flow.


Marxian economics distinguishes between different forms of capital:

- constant capital, which refers to capital goods
- variable capital, which refers to labor-inputs, where the cost is “variable” based on the amount of wages and salaries are paid throughout the duration of an employee’s contract/employment,
- fictitious capital, which refers to intangible representations or abstractions of physical capital, such as stocks, bonds and securities (or “tradable paper claims to wealth”)

Earlier illustrations often described capital as physical items, such as tools, buildings, and vehicles that are used in the production process. Since at least the 1960s economists have increasingly focused on broader forms of capital. For example, investment in skills and education can be viewed as building up human capital or knowledge capital, and investments in intellectual property can be viewed as building up intellectual capital. These terms lead to certain questions and controversies discussed in those articles.

The fundamental activities of a corporate financial institution as lending, borrowing, investing, and asset liability management, shall be organized in a flow chart to present a business line for the company and its members or (Shareholders) of the Organization shows a need to finance its members (chapters) loans, and for the organization to fund these loans and then invest the income generated and hedge the potential risk of its holdings. We can look as this diagram is a sketch of the “Treasury Operations” within a financial institution.

The chart shows the capital inflow and outflow of the operations of the treasury, or position of the “Keeper of the Finance”.

2. LENDING
3. BORROWING
4. ASSETS & LIABILITIES
5. DONATIONS

African American Alumni Honor Julius Chapman, PhD. with Permanent Honorary Bench at Towson University

Towson, MD. November 3, 2018. On Saturday November 3, 2018, during Towson University 2018 Homecoming Weekend, Brother Dr. Julius Chapman, affectionately called “Dean Chapman”, was honored for his service to Towson University with a surprise Commemorative Permanent Bench Dedication Ceremony. The bench is located outside the Media Center facing his former office in Van Bokkelen Hall. This is the first honorarium for an African American staff member at Towson State University. Brother Dr. Julius Chapman was initiated into Omega Psi Phi Fraternity in 1956 through Lambda Epsilon at Tuskegee Institute, now University, and currently a member of Tau Pi Chapter in Howard County, MD. During the late 60’s and early 70’s, Brother Dr. Julius Chapman held the position of Dean of Minority Affairs at Towson State University, then College, and was charged with increasing the minority enrollment and graduation rate of minority students to meet Federal and State guidelines for the university. He personally mentored to every African American and other minority students enrolled at Towson University during this period and single handedly aided the university in meeting its Federal and State requirements for minority enrollment. The Bench Dedication Ceremony outpouring of love and appreciation was led by Towson Alum Mrs. Jewel Graves-Tucker and a surprise to Brother Dean Chapman. Towson University President Kim Schatzel gave comments representing Towson University at the dedication and her staff

was in attendance. Omega Psi Phi Iota Epsilon Chapter Alum Brother Jeff Perry opened the Bench Dedication Ceremony with a prayer. Mrs. Jewel Graves-Tucker was the Mistress of Ceremonies. His stewardship also aided the diaspora of minority Towson Alum to become Towson University staff and thus become a viable part of the Towson University community. Several TSU African American alumni gave heartfelt testimonies of Dean Chapman’s legacy including Iota Epsilon Chapter Alums, Ron Jones and Robert Washington, TSU Sports Hall of Famer. Dean Chapman is considered the “Father of Iota Epsilon Chapter” at Towson University. In 1975, he was the Omega Man who 12 interested young men asked for guidance to pledge Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and charter a chapter at Towson State University. Through his mentorship, in 1976, Iota Epsilon Chapter was the first Divine Nine Men’s fraternity to be chartered on Towson’s campus. During this period, he became the first Iota Epsilon Undergraduate Chapter Advisor. At the dedication, current Iota Epsilon Chapter Basileus, Michal Williams, spoke from the heart of Dean Chapman’s impact on Iota Epsilon Chapter. Overwhelmed with the gesture, Brother Dr. Julius Chapman maintained his composure in thanking those assembled and not in attendance. After the ribbon cutting, Dean Chapman took his first seat on the bench with joy. Iota Epsilon Chapter Alum, Brother Bishop Kevia Elliott, gave benediction for the ceremony with a prayer.



Some of his advice was to be open and flexible about the specific jobs they take, not knowing where something will lead. He also used the experiences of his career and talk about his passion for space science to apply it to all disciplines and fields of interest, so that all Project ENRICH students could relate.

“I found this piece of paper when I retired, and do you know that I exceeded every step I set for myself?” Adams said rhetorically. “some of you might be sitting here saying my goal today is to graduate from college. I’m here today to tell you that you can do better. I’m here to tell you

that you can change the world. And the world needs you. The world needs people like you. This world has problems that haven’t even been invented yet that you’re going to have to solve. This world is going to have jobs that you don’t even know about yet that you’re going to have to occupy.” He told the story of how he turned an interest in physics and electrical engineering into a 27-year career at NASA running the billion-dollar Planetary Science Program for the space agency. “It was the coolest job.” He wowed the students with his recounting of how his job had him overseeing such high-profile projects as the Rover on Mars, the Probe that flew by Pluto, the Jupiter spacecraft mission and the Messenger that studied Mercury. He explained how he didn’t go to an “upper tier” school and never envisioned himself running such an important initiative because many of the technologies he worked with had not yet been invented when he started his career. His overriding message was learn to follow your passion and think big.

The tower was initially known as the “Phoenix Shot Tower,” then the “Merchants’ Shot Tower,” and now is also sometimes called the “Old Baltimore Shot Tower.” It was designated a National Historic Landmark on November 11, 1971.

were given to thirteen (13) contestants. The awards were a certificate of performance and a gift card from Giant Foods (local food market).






